Independent Auditor's Report

To the Board of Education

We have audited the cash basis financial statements of the governmental activities, the aggregate discretely presented component units, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the United Township High School District No. 30 as of and for the year ended June 30, 2016, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the District's basic financial statements. The basic financial statements have been audited; however they are not presented as part of the Annual Financial Report form. The basic financial statements should be read in conjunction with the following auditor's opinion. Our opinion reads as follows:

Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the accompanying cash basis financial statements of the governmental activities, the aggregate discretely presented component units, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the United Township High School District No. 30 as of and for the year ended June 30, 2016, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the District's cash basis basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with the cash basis of accounting described in Note 1; this includes determining that the cash basis of accounting is an acceptable basis for the preparation of the financial statements in the circumstances. Management is also responsible for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinions.

Opinions

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective cash basis financial position of the governmental activities, the aggregate discretely presented component units, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of United Township High School District No. 30 as of June 30, 2016, and the respective changes in cash basis financial position for the year then ended in accordance with the cash basis of accounting described in Note 1.

Other Matters

Supplementary and Other Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements as a whole that collectively comprise the District's basic financial statements. The combining schedules and other schedules listed in the table of contents as supplementary information are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the basic financial statements. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements or to the basic financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the supplementary information is fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the basic financial statements taken as a whole on the basis of accounting described in Note 1.

The accompanying introductory section, management's discussion and analysis and other information, as listed in the table of contents, are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the basic financial statements. This information has not been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in our audit of the basic financial statements and, accordingly, we express no opinion or provide any assurance on them.

Basis of Accounting

We draw attention to Note 1 of the financial statements, which describes the basis of accounting. The financial statements are prepared on the cash basis of accounting, which is a basis of accounting other than accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. Our opinions are not modified with respect to this matter.

Other Reporting Required by *Government Auditing Standards*

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated September 14, 2016 on our consideration of the United Township High School District No. 30's internal control over financial reporting and our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering the District's internal control over financial reporting and compliance.

Report on Other Legal and Regulatory Requirements

As described more fully in Note 1, these regulatory-based financial statements are issued to comply with regulatory provisions prescribed by the Illinois State Board of Education, which is a comprehensive basis of accounting other than, and differs from, accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. They are intended to assure effective legislative and public oversight of school district financing and spending activities of accountable Illinois public school districts. The effect on the financial statements of the variances between these regulatory accounting practices and accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, although not reasonable determinable, are presumed to be material.

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the District's basic financial statements. The accompanying regulatory-based financial statements, as listed in the table of contents of this Annual Financial Report form, are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the basic financial statements of United Township High School District No. 30. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the information is fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the basic financial statements taken as a whole.

This report is intended solely for the information and the use of the Board of Education, management of United Township High School District No. 30, and the Illinois State Board of Education and is not intended to be and should not be used by anyone other than these specified parties.

Nature of operations:

United Township High School District No. 30 (UTHS) is a high school located in Rock Island and Henry Counties in Illinois. District No. 30 serves students from Barstow, Carbon Cliff, Colona, East Moline, Hampton, Silvis, portions of Moline and upper Rock Island County. Five elementary school districts (Carbon Cliff/Barstow, Colona, East Moline, Hampton and Silvis) and two private schools (Our Lady of Grace Catholic Academy and East Moline Christian School) send students to further their education at UTHS. The District was created under Illinois State Statutes. The District has the power to make rules and regulations for its own government consistent with the laws of the state of Illinois and the regulations of the Illinois State Board of Education. The District is governed by the United Township High School District No. 30 Board which is elected at large in the general elections.

Financial reporting entity and basis of presentation:

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require the financial reporting entity include (1) the primary government, (2) organizations for which the primary government is financially accountable and (3) other organizations for which the nature and significance of their relationships with the primary government are such that exclusion would cause the reporting entity's financial statements to be misleading or incomplete.

United Township High School District No. 30 is governed by a Board of Education, which is elected by the public and has the exclusive responsibility and accountability for the decisions it makes. The District has the statutory authority to adopt its own budget, to levy taxes and to issue bonded debt without the approval of another government. It has the right to sue and be sued, and has the right to buy, sell, lease or mortgage property in its own name. Based on these criteria, the District is considered a primary government and includes the following component units because the District exercises significant influence over the assets, operations and management of these organizations. Both of the component units have a June 30 year-end and are discretely presented.

United Township Area Career Center: The United Township Area Career Center (ACC) is formed under a joint agreement to provide specialized career and technical education programs for students from member school districts. A Board of Control, comprised of Superintendents of the member school districts, governs the joint agreement and designates an administrative, legal, and fiscal agent. United Township High School District No. 30 serves as the administrative, legal, and fiscal agent for the ACC. The ACC issues separate financial statements under its own RCDT code and financial records are located at 1275 Avenue of the Cities, East Moline, Illinois 61244.

Quad-City Career & Technical Education Consortium: The Quad-City Career & Technical Education Consortium (QCC TEC) is formed by a joint agreement to provide regional career and technical education services as a part of the Illinois Education For Employment (EFE) program. QCC TEC includes member school districts located primarily in Rock Island, Henry, Mercer, and Stark counties. A Board of Control, comprised of Superintendents from member school districts, governs the joint agreement and designates a member school district to act as administrative, legal, and fiscal agent for QCC TEC. QCC TEC issues separate financial statements under its own RCDT code and financial records are located at 1275 Avenue of the Cities, East Moline, Illinois 61244.

The District's basic financial statements consist of government-wide statements, including a statement of net position and a statement of activities and fund financial statements which provides a more detailed level of financial information.

Government-wide financial statements: The statement of net position and the statement of activities report information on all of the nonfiduciary activities of the District within the limitations of cash basis accounting. These statements include the financial activities of the primary government. The District does not have any activities that are considered business-type activities. The statement of activities presents a comparison between direct disbursements and program receipts for each program or function of the District's governmental activities. Direct expenses are those that are specifically associated with a service, program or department and are, therefore, clearly identifiable to a particular function. Program receipts include charges paid by the recipient of the goods or services offered by the program, grants and contributions that are restricted to meeting the operational or capital requirements of a particular program and interest earned on grants that is required to be used to support a particular program. Receipts which are not classified as program receipts are presented as general receipts of the District. The comparison of direct disbursements with program receipts identifies the extent to which each governmental function is self-financing or draws from the general receipts of the District.

Fund financial statements: During the year, the District segregates transactions related to certain District functions or activities in separate funds in order to aid financial management and to demonstrate legal compliance. Fund financial statements are designed to present financial information of the District at this more detailed level. The focus of governmental fund financial statements is on major funds. Major funds are presented in separate columns. Nonmajor funds are aggregated and presented in a single column.

Measurement focus, basis of accounting and financial statement presentation:

United Township High School District No. 30 maintains its financial records on the basis of cash receipts and disbursements and the financial statements of the District are prepared on that basis which is a comprehensive basis of accounting other than U.S. generally accepted accounting principles. Accordingly, revenue is recognized and recorded in the account when cash is received. In the same manner, expenditures are recognized and recorded upon the disbursement of cash. The cash basis of accounting does not give effect to accounts receivable, accounts payable and accrued items.

Proceeds from sales of bonds are included as other financing sources in the appropriate fund on the date received. Related bond principal payable in the future is disclosed in the notes to the financial statements.

The District uses funds to maintain its financial records during the fiscal year. A fund is defined as a fiscal and accounting entity with a self-balancing set of accounts. There are three categories of funds: governmental, proprietary and fiduciary. The District maintains governmental funds, one proprietary fund and fiduciary funds.

Governmental funds: Governmental funds are those through which most governmental functions typically are financed. Governmental fund reporting focuses on the sources, uses and balances of current financial resources. Expendable assets are assigned to the various governmental funds according to the purposes for which they may or must be used. The following are the District's major governmental funds:

General Fund: The General Fund accounts for all financial resources except those required to be accounted for in another fund. The General Fund balance is available to the District for any purpose provided it is expended or transferred according to the general laws of Illinois.

The Capital projects fund: The Capital projects fund accounts for the revenue from the school facility occupation tax and school facility expenditures allowable under the state statute.

The other governmental funds of the District are considered nonmajor and are as follows:

Special revenue funds: These funds account for revenue sources that are legally restricted to expenditures for specific purposes. A description of each of the District's nonmajor special revenue funds follows:

Tort immunity and judgment fund: This fund accounts for all revenue received and expenditures made for tort immunity or tort judgment purposes. Revenue is derived primarily from local property taxes.

Transportation fund: The Transportation Fund is a special revenue fund which accounts for all revenue received and expenditures made for student transportation to and from school. Revenue is derived primarily from local property taxes and state reimbursement grants.

Municipal retirement/social security fund: This fund accounts for the District's portion of pension contributions to the Illinois Municipal Retirement Fund, and the District's share of social security and Medicare costs for covered employees. Revenue to finance the contributions is derived primarily from local property taxes.

School activity fund: This fund accounts for the monies generated by the schools and student organizations via fund raising activities for use in academic, athletic and club activities.

Debt service fund: This fund accounts for the accumulation of resources for, and the payment of, general long-term debt principal, interest and related costs.

Capital projects funds: Capital projects funds account for and report financial resources that are restricted, committed or assigned for the acquisition of property and equipment or construction of major capital projects. A description of the District's nonmajor capital project fund follows:

Fire prevention and safety fund: The Fire Prevention and Safety Fund, a capital projects fund, accounts for the revenue and expenditures related to fire prevention and safety projects.

Proprietary Fund: The Internal Service Fund is used to account for goods or services provided by one department to the other departments of the District on a cost reimbursement basis. The District's Internal Service Fund is used to account for the premium and claim payments for the self-insured health insurance plan for District employees.

Fiduciary Funds: The District maintains two fiduciary fund types, an other employee benefit fund and agency funds. The other employee benefit fund consists of the District's Flexible Benefit Plan. The agency funds consist of memorials and scholarship funds held for the benefit of others.

Significant accounting policies

The significant accounting policies followed by the District include the following:

Cash: The District considers all demand savings accounts to be cash equivalents. Earnings from pooled accounts are allocated to the respective funds based on the average balance of each fund.

Capital assets: General capital assets have been acquired for general governmental purposes. All capital assets are capitalized at cost (or estimated historical cost) and updated for additions and retirements during the year. Donated capital assets are recorded at their fair values as of the date received. At the time of purchase, assets with expected useful lives that exceed one year and cost more than \$5,000, are recorded as expenditures paid in the governmental funds and capitalized in the

District's records. Improvements are capitalized; the costs of normal maintenance and repairs that do not add to the value of the asset or materially extend an asset's life are not capitalized. All capital assets except land are depreciated. Improvements are depreciated over the remaining useful lives of the related capital assets. Depreciation is computed using the straight-line method over the following useful lives:

Property taxes: The District's property tax is levied each year on all taxable real property located in the District on or before the last Tuesday in December and attach as an enforceable lien on the property as of the preceding January 1. Property taxes attach as an enforceable lien on property as of the January 1, and are payable in four installments for Rock Island County in June, August, September and November and two installments in Henry County in June and November. The District receives significant distributions of tax receipts approximately one month after these due dates. Taxes recorded in these financial statements are from the 2015, 2014 and prior levies.

Interfund transactions: Transactions from District funds that would be treated as receipts and disbursements if they involved organizations external to the District are accounted for a receipts and disbursements in the funds involved.

Transactions which constitute reimbursements to a fund for expenditures initially made from it which are properly applicable to another fund are recorded as expenditures in the reimbursing fund and as reductions of expenditures in the reimbursed fund.

Transactions which constitute the transfer of resources from a fund receiving revenues to a fund through which revenues are to be expended, are separately reported in the respective funds' operating statements.

For the statement of activities, transfers within the governmental activities are netted and eliminated.

Fund equity: In the governmental fund financial statements fund balances are classified as follows:

Nonspendable: Nonspendable fund balances are balances that cannot be spent because they are not expected to be converted to cash or they are legally or contractually required to remain intact. The District does not have any nonspendable fund balances.

Spendable: Spendable fund balances are based on a hierarchy of spending constraints as follows:

Restricted: Amounts restricted to specific purposes when constraints placed on the use of the resources are either externally imposed by creditors, grantors or state or federal laws or imposed by law through constitutional provisions or enabling legislation.

Committed: Amounts which can be used only for specific purposes determined pursuant to constraints formally imposed by the Board of Education through resolution approved prior to year-end.

Assigned: Amounts which contain self-imposed constraints of the District to be used for a particular purpose. The authority to assign fund balance has been delegated to the Superintendent.

Unassigned: All amounts not included in other spendable classifications as well as any deficit fund balance of any other governmental fund. The General Fund is the only fund that would report a positive amount in unassigned fund balance.

When an expenditure is incurred in governmental funds which can be paid using either restricted or unrestricted resources, the District and component units' policy is to pay the expenditure from restricted fund balance then from less restrictive classifications – committed, assigned and finally unassigned fund balances.

Net Position: Net position are reported as restricted when there are limitations imposed on their use either through the enabling legislation adopted by the District or through external restrictions imposed by creditors, grantors or laws or regulations of other governments. Net position restricted through enabling legislation for the District consisted of \$1,894,839 for transportation, \$693,931 for student activities, \$1,500,773 for tort immunity activities, \$1,225,910 for municipal retirement, \$475,760 for debt service, \$1,289,886 for life safety projects, \$2,221,674 for capital projects, \$2,728,545 for working cash and \$467,158 for self- insurance. Net position restricted through enabling legislation for the ACC consisted of \$33,167 for student activities. The Consortium did not have any amounts restricted for career and technical education programs as of June 30, 2016 due to the timing of reimbursements for the program. The District and component units first apply restricted resources when an expense is incurred for purposes for which both restricted and unrestricted net position is available.

Note 2. Cash and Investments

The District is allowed to invest in securities as authorized by the Illinois Public Funds Investment Act – 30 ILCS 235/2 and 6; and the Illinois School Code – 105 ILCS 5/8-7. The District is also authorized to invest in Illinois School District Liquid Asset Funds, the Illinois Funds Money Market Fund and the Illinois Funds Prime Funds, which invests member deposits, on a pooled basis, primarily in short-term obligations of major United States corporations and banks.

Custodial credit risk: Custodial credit risk for deposits is the risk that, in the event of a depository financial institution failure, the District's deposits may not be returned to it. The District's policy requires when monies are invested in a financial institution, procedures mandated by state law shall be followed regarding the insuring of such monies. The policy also states that all amounts deposited or invested with financial institutions in excess of any insurance limit shall be collateralized by securities eligible for District investment or any other high-quality, interest-bearing security rated at least AA/Aa by one or more standard rating services to include Standard & Poor's, Moody's or Fitch. The preferred method for safekeeping is to have securities registered in the District's name and held by a third-party custodian. The market value of the pledged securities shall equal or exceed the portion of the deposit requiring collateralization.

As of June 30, 2016, the District had debt outstanding in the amount of \$3,000,000. The long-term debt consists of the following:

Bonded indebtedness: Bonded indebtedness requirements for principal and interest expenditures are payable from future revenues of the Debt Service Fund. The revenues consist principally of property taxes collected by the District and interest earnings.

Life safety bonds issued in the original amount of \$1,000,000, dated February 23, 2016 provides for the serial retirement of principal payable annually on December 1 and interest due semi-annually at a rate of 1.5% with maturity December 1, 2018. At June 30, 2016, there was principal outstanding in the amount of \$1,000,000.

Note 5. Employee Retirement Systems and Pension Plans

The District participates in two retirement systems: the Illinois Municipal Retirement Fund (IMRF) and the Teachers' Retirement System of the State of Illinois (TRS). Members of TRS consist of all full-time teachers and teachers employed on a part-time basis in positions where services are expected to be rendered for a full and complete school term. Employees, other than teachers, who meet prescribed annual hourly standards, are members of IMRF.

Illinois Municipal Retirement Fund

Plan Administration - The District's defined benefit pension plan for regular employees provides retirement and disability benefits, post retirement increases and death benefits to plan members and beneficiaries. The District plan is managed by the Illinois Municipal Retirement Fund (IMRF), the administrator of a multi-employer public pension fund and agent multiple-employer plan. Benefit and contribution provisions are established by statute and may only be changed by the General Assembly of the State of Illinois. IMRF issues a publicly available financial report that includes financial statements and required supplementary information (RSI). That report may be obtained on-line at www.imrf.org. The IMRF actuarial valuation date is December 31, 2015 and the measurement date is December 31, 2015.

IMRF is administered in accordance with Illinois statutes. The statutes do not provide for termination of the plan under any circumstances.

Benefits Provided – The IMRF Plan provides retirement benefits, as well as death and disability benefits. A complete description of IMRF benefits is found in Article 7 of the Illinois Pension Code. IMRF has three benefit plans. The vast majority of IMRF members, including the District, participate in the Regular Plan (RP). IMRF benefits have two tiers.

Employees hired before January 1, 2011 are eligible for Tier 1 benefits. Tier 1 employees are vested for pension benefits when they have at least eight years of qualifying service credit. Tier 1 employees who retire at age 55 (at reduced benefits) or after age 60 (at full benefits) with eight years of service are entitled to an annual retirement benefit, payable monthly for life, in an amount equal to 1 -2/3% of the final rate of earnings for the first 15 years of service credit, plus 2% for each year of service credit after 15 years to a maximum of 75% of their final rate of earnings. Final rate of earnings is the highest total earnings during any consecutive 48 months within the last 10 years of service, divided by 48. Under Tier 1, the pension is increased by 3% of the original amount on January 1, every year after retirement.

Employees hired on or after January 1, 2011, are eligible for Tier 2 benefits. For Tier 2 employees, pension benefits vest after ten years of service. Participating employees who retire at age 62 (at reduced benefits) or after age 67 (at full benefits) with ten years of service are entitled to an annual retirement benefit, payable monthly for life, in an amount equal to 1-2/3% of the final rate of earnings for the first 15 years of service credit, plus 2% for each year of service credit after 15 years to a maximum of 75% of their final rate of earnings. Final rate of earnings is the highest total earnings during any 96 consecutive months within the last 10 years of service, divided by 96. Under Tier 2, the pension is increased on January 1 every year after retirement, upon reaching age 67, by the lesser of 3% of the original pension amount or ½ of the increase in the Consumer Price Index of the original pension amount.

Contributions – As set by statute, the District's regular plan members are required to contribute 4.5 percent of their annual covered salary. The statute requires each participating employer to contribute the amount necessary, in addition to member contributions, to finance the retirement coverage of its own employees. The District's annual contribution rate for calendar year 2015 was 12.21 percent. For the fiscal year ended June 30, 2016, the District contributed \$358,392 to the plan. The covered valuation payroll as of December 31, 2015 was \$2,934,853. The District also contributes for disability benefits, death benefits, and supplemental retirement benefits, all of which are pooled at the IMRF level. Contribution rates for disability and death benefits are set by the IMRF Board of Trustees while the supplemental retirement benefits rate is set by statute.

Net Pension Liability of the District – The District's net pension liability was measured as of December 31, 2015. The total net pension liability used to calculate the net pension liability was determined by an actuarial valuation as of that date.

For non-disabled retirees, mortality rates were based on an IMRF specific mortality table with fully generational projection scale MP-2014 (base year 2014). The IMRF specific rates were developed from the RP-2014 Blue Collar Health Annuitant Mortality Table with adjustments to match current IMRF experience. For disabled retirees, an IMRF-specific mortality table was used with fully generational project scale MP-2014 (base year 2014). The IMRF-specific rates were developed from the RP-2014 Disabled Retirees Mortality Table applying the same adjustment that were applied for non-disabled lives.

For active members, an IMRF specific mortality table was used with fully projection scale MP-2014 (base year 2014). The IMRF specific rates were developed from the RP-2014 Employee Mortality Table with adjustments to match current IMRF experience.

The long-term expected rate of return on pension plan investments was determined using a building-block method in which best-estimate ranges of expected future real rates of return (expected returns, net of pension plan investment expense and inflation) are developed for each major asset class. These ranges are combined to produce the long-term expected rate of return by weighting the expected future real rates of return by the target asset allocation percentage and by adding expected inflation. Best estimates of arithmetic real rates of return for each major asset class included in the pension plan's target asset allocation as of December 31, 2015 are summarized in the following table:

Discount rate: Governmental Accounting Standards Board Statement No. 68 requires a discount rate that considers the ability of the fund to meet benefit obligations in the future. To make this determination, employer contributions, employee contributions, benefit payments, expenses and investment returns are projected into the future. The plan net position in future years can then be determined and compared to its obligation to make benefit payments in those years. As long as assets are projected to be on hand in a future year, the assumed valuation discount rate is used. In years where assets are not projected to be sufficient to meet benefit payments, the use of a "risk-free" rate is required.

The single discount rate (SDR) is equivalent to applying these two rates to the benefits that are projected to be paid during the different time periods. The SDR reflects:

1. The long-term expected rate of return on the pension plan investments (during the period in which the fiduciary net position is projected to be sufficient to pay benefits)
2. Tax-exempt municipal bond rates based on an index of 20-year general obligation bonds with an average AA credit rating (which is published by the Federal Reserve) as the measurement date (to the extent that the contributions for use with the long-term expected rate of return are not met).

The projection of cash flow used to determine this SDR assumed that the plan members' contributions will be made at the current contribution rate, and that employer contributions will be made at rates equal to the difference between the actuarially determined contribution rates and the member rate.

For the purpose of the District's valuation, the expected rate of return on pension plan investments is 7.50 percent, the municipal bond rate is 3.57 percent and the resulting single discount rate is 7.47 percent.

Teachers' Retirement System of the State of Illinois

Plan description: The District participates in the Teachers' Retirement System of the State of Illinois (TRS). TRS is a cost-sharing multiple-employer defined benefit pension plan that was created by the Illinois legislature for the benefit of Illinois public school teachers employed outside the city of Chicago. TRS members include all active non-annuitants who are employed by a TRS-covered employer to provide services for which teacher licensure is required. The Illinois Pension Code outlines the benefit provisions of TRS, and amendments to the plan can be made only by legislative action with the Governor's approval. The TRS Board of Trustees is responsible for the System's administration. TRS issues a publicly available financial report that can be obtained at <http://trs.illinois.gov/pubs/cafr> by writing to TRS at 2815 W. Washington, PO Box 19253, Springfield, IL 62794; or by calling (888) 877-0890, option 2.

Benefits provided: TRS provides retirement, disability, and death benefits. Tier I members have TRS or reciprocal system service prior to January 1, 2011. Tier I members qualify for retirement benefits at age 62 with five years of service, at age 60 with 10 years, or age 55 with 20 years. The benefit is determined by the average of the four highest years of creditable earnings within the last 10 years of creditable service and the percentage of average salary to which the member is entitled. Most members retire under a formula that provides 2.2 percent of final average salary up to a maximum of 75 percent with 34 years of service. Disability and death benefits are also provided.

Tier II members qualify for retirement benefits at age 67 with 10 years of service, or a discounted annuity can be paid at age 62 with 10 years of service. Creditable earnings for retirement purposes are capped and the final average salary is based on the highest consecutive eight years of creditable service rather than the last four. Disability provisions for Tier II are identical to those of Tier I. Death benefits are payable under a formula that is different from Tier I.

Essentially all Tier I retirees receive an annual 3 percent increase in the current retirement benefit beginning January 1 following the attainment of age 61 or on January 1 following the member's first anniversary in retirement, whichever is later. Tier II annual increases will be the lesser of three percent of the original benefit or one-half percent of the rate of inflation beginning January 1 following attainment of age 67 or on January 1 following the member's first anniversary in retirement, whichever is later.

Contributions: The state of Illinois maintains the primary responsibility for funding TRS. The Illinois Pension Code, as amended by Public Act 88-0593 and subsequent acts, provides that for years 2010 through 2045, the minimum contribution to the System for each fiscal year shall be an amount determined to be sufficient to bring the total assets of the System up to 90 percent of the total actuarial liabilities of the System by the end of fiscal year 2045. Contributions from active members and TRS contributing employers are also required by the Illinois Pension Code. The contribution rates are specified in the pension code. The active member contribution rate for the year ended June 30, 2016, was 9.4 percent of creditable earnings. The member contribution, which may be paid on behalf of employees by the employer, is submitted to TRS by the employer.

On behalf contributions to TRS: The state of Illinois makes employer pension contributions on behalf of the employer. For the year ended June 30, 2016, state of Illinois contributions recognized by the employer were based on the state's proportionate share of the collective net pension liability associated with the employer, and the employer recognized revenue and expenditures of \$4,674,139 in pension contributions from the state of Illinois.

2.2 formula contributions: Employers contribute 0.58 percent of total creditable earnings for the 2.2 formula changes. The contribution rate is specified by statute. Contributions for the year ended June 30, 2016, were \$51,393 and, on an accrual basis, would be deferred because they were paid after the June 30, 2015 measurement date.

Federal and special trust fund contributions: When TRS members are paid from federal and special trust funds administered by the employer, there is a statutory requirement for the employer to pay an employer pension contribution from those funds. Under a policy adopted by the TRS Board of Trustees that has been in effect since the fiscal year ended June 30, 2006, employer contributions for employees paid from federal and special trust funds will be the same as the state contribution rate to TRS. Public Act 98-0674 now requires the two rates to be the same.

For the year ended June 30, 2016, the employer pension contribution was 36.06 percent of salaries paid from federal and special trust funds. For the year ended June 30, 2016, salaries totaling \$297,137 were paid from federal and special trust funds that required employer contributions of \$106,905. These contributions, on an accrual basis, would be deferred because they were paid after the June 30, 2015 measurement date.

Employer retirement cost contributions: Under GASB Statement No. 68, contributions that an employer is required to pay because of a TRS member retiring are categorized as specific liability payments. The employer is required to make a one-time contribution to TRS for members retiring under the Early Retirement Option (ERO). The payments vary depending on the member's age and salary. The maximum employer ERO contribution under the current program is 146.5 percent and applies when the member is age 55 at retirement. For the year ended June 30, 2016, the employer paid \$0 to TRS for employer ERO contributions.

The employer is also required to make a one-time contribution to TRS for members granted salary increases over 6 percent if those salaries are used to calculate a retiree's final average salary. A one-time contribution is also required for members granted sick leave days in excess of the normal annual allotment if those days are used as TRS service credit. For the year ended June 30, 2016, the employer paid \$0 to TRS for employer contributions due on salary increases in excess of 6 percent and \$0 for sick leave days granted in excess of the normal annual allotment.

The actuarial assumptions for the years ended June 30, 2015 and 2014 were different. The actuarial assumptions used in the June 30, 2015 valuation were based on the 2015 actuarial experience analysis. The investment return assumption remained at 7.5 percent, salary increase assumptions were lowered, retirement rates were increased, mortality updates were made and other assumptions were revised. The actuarial assumptions used in the June 30, 2014 valuation were based on updates to economic assumptions adopted in 2014 which lowered the investment return assumption from 8.0 percent to 7.5 percent. The salary increase and inflation assumptions were also lowered from their 2013 levels.

The long-term expected rate of return on pension plan investments was determined using a building-block method in which best-estimate ranges of expected future real rates of return (expected returns, net of pension plan investment expense and inflation) are developed for each major asset class. These ranges are combined to produce the long-term expected rate of return by weighting the expected future real rates of return by the target asset allocation percentage and by adding expected inflation.

Discount rate: At June 30, 2015, the discount rate used to measure the total pension liability was a blended rate of 7.47 percent, which was a change from the June 30, 2014 rate of 7.50 percent. The projection of cash flows used to determine the discount rate assumed that employee contributions, employer contributions, and state contributions will be made at the current statutorily-required rates.

Based on those assumptions, TRS's fiduciary net position at June 30, 2015 was not projected to be available to make all projected future benefit payments of current active and inactive members and all benefit recipients. Tier 1's liability is partially funded by Tier II members, as the Tier II member contribution is higher than the cost of Tier II benefits. Due to this subsidy, contributions from future members in excess of the service cost are also included in the determination of the discount rate. Despite the subsidy, all projected future payments were not covered, so a slightly lower long-term expected rate of return on TRS investments was applied to all periods of projected benefit payments to determine the total pension liability.

At June 30, 2014, the discount rate used to measure the total pension liability was 7.50 percent. The discount rate was the same as the actuarially-assumed rate of return on investments that year because TRS's fiduciary net position and the subsidy provided by Tier II were sufficient to cover all projected benefit payments.

Illinois Teacher Health Insurance Security ("THIS")

Plan description- The District participates in the Teacher Health Insurance Security Fund, a cost-sharing, multiple-employer defined benefit postemployment health care plan that was established by the Illinois legislature for the benefit of retired Illinois public school teachers employed outside the city of Chicago. The THIS Fund provides medical, prescription and behavioral health benefits, but it does not provide vision, dental or life insurance benefits to annuitants of TRS. Annuitants not enrolled in Medicare may participate in the state-administered participating provider option plan or choose from several managed care options. Annuitants who are enrolled in Medicare Parts A and B may be eligible to enroll in Medicare Advantage plans.

The State Employees Group Insurance Act of 1971 (5 ILCS 375) outlines the benefit provisions of the THIS Fund and amendments to the plan can be made only by legislative action with the Governor's approval. The plan is administered by the Illinois Department of Central Management Services (CMS) with the cooperation of TRS. Section 6.6 of the State of Employees Group Insurance Act of 1971 requires all active contributors to TRS who are not employees of the state to make a contribution to the THIS fund.

The percentage of employer required contributions in the future will not exceed 105 percent of the percentage of salary actually required to be paid in the previous fiscal year.

On-behalf contributions to THIS Fund: The state of Illinois makes employer retiree health insurance contributions on behalf of the District. State contributions are intended to match contributions to THIS Fund from active members which were 1.07 percent of pay during the year ended June 30, 2016. State of Illinois contributions were \$94,709 and the District recognized revenue and expenditures of this amount during the year. State contributions intended to match active member contributions during the years ended June 30, 2015 and 2014 were 1.02 and 0.97 percent of pay, respectively. State contributions on behalf of District employees were \$89,896 and \$83,772, respectively.

Employer contributions to the THIS Fund: The District also makes contributions to the THIS Fund. The District THIS Fund contribution was 0.80 percent during the year ended June 30, 2016 and 0.76 percent and 0.72 percent during years ended June 30, 2015 and 2014. For the year ended June 30, 2016, the District paid \$70,811 to the THIS Fund. For the years ended June 30, 2015 and 2014, the District paid \$66,981 and \$62,182 to the THIS Fund, respectively, which was 100 percent of the required contribution. The current reports are listed under "Central Management Services." Prior reports are available under "Healthcare and Family Services."

Social Security: Employees not qualifying for coverage under the Illinois Downstate Teachers' Retirement System or the Illinois Municipal Retirement Fund are considered "non-participating employees." These employees and those qualifying for coverage under the Illinois Municipal Retirement Fund are covered under Social Security.

Medicare: All employees, except certified personnel hired prior to April 1, 1986 are covered under the Basic Hospital Insurance Plan provision of the Medicare health insurance program.

Note 6. Contingencies and Commitments

Compensated absences: The District has a policy allowing full-time personnel to accumulate sick days that are earned annually and allowed to accumulate and carryover from year to year up to a specified maximum. These days are not considered to vest as they are only redeemable in the future as compensated absences in the case of illness or disability.

Other postemployment benefits: Upon retirement, IMRF retirees may select to continue coverage under the District health insurance program. Retirees participating in the medical plan must pay 100 percent of the cost of their required contributions each month. Employees retiring under the TRS may not continue coverage under the District health insurance program beyond elected COBRA coverage. They may elect coverage under the state health insurance plan (THIS) for certified employees. Qualified retirees are retired employees who attain the age of 55 prior to retirement and who provide ten years of service to the District. The plan does not issue a stand-alone financial report.

Grant adjustments: The District has received funding from state and federal grants in the current and prior years which are subject to audits by the granting agencies. The District believes any adjustments that may arise from these audits will be insignificant to the District's operations.

Corporate personal property replacement tax: In April 2016, local governments in the state of Illinois received a notice from the Illinois Department of Revenue that the state had misallocated corporate personal property replacement tax which resulted in overpayments to local governments. The overpayment to the District is estimated by the Illinois Department of Revenue to be approximately \$270,141. The state plans to reduce the District's corporate personal property replacement taxes over the next two fiscal years by the estimated overpayment.

The District also leases a building from the Rock Island County Agriculture Fair Association and the East Moline Municipal Pool. Note 9. Risk Management

The District is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts; theft of, damage to and destruction of assets; errors and omissions; injuries to employees; and natural disasters. The District's risk management activities are recorded in the operating fund responsible for the liability. Significant losses are covered by commercial insurance for all major programs except for workers' compensation, unemployment insurance and claim payments for health insurance. For all insured programs, there have been no significant reductions in insurance coverage. Settlement amounts have not exceeded insurance coverage for the current year or the three prior years.

The District is self-insured for unemployment insurance. The District is therefore liable to the State for any payments made to any of its former employees claiming unemployment benefits.

During the current year, the District has established an internal service fund to account for premium and claim payments for a self-insured group health insurance plan for the District's employees to meet potential losses from medical claims. Self-insurance is in effect up to an individual stop loss amount of \$55,000 and aggregate amount of approximately \$1,241,791. Unpaid claims include all known claims and an amount for claims that have been incurred but are not reported (IBNR). Unpaid claims are estimated by considering the effects of inflation, recent claim settlement trends, including frequency and amount of pay-outs, and other economic and social factors.

The District adopted the following statements during the year ended June 30, 2016:

GASB Statement No. 72, *Fair Value Measurement and Application*, issued February 2015. This Statement addresses accounting and financial reporting issues related to fair value measurements. The definition of *fair value* is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. This Statement provides guidance for determining a fair value measurement for financial reporting purposes. This Statement also provides guidance for applying fair value to certain investments and disclosures related to all fair value measurements.

GASB Statement No. 73, *Accounting and Financial Reporting for Pensions and Related Assets That Are Not within the Scope of GASB Statement 68, and Amendments to Certain Provisions of GASB Statements 67 and 68*, issued June 2015. This Statement establishes requirements for defined benefit pensions that are not within the scope of Statement No. 68, *Accounting and Financial Reporting for Pensions*, as well as for the assets accumulated for purposes of providing those pensions. In addition, it establishes requirements for defined contribution pensions that are not within the scope of Statement 68.

It also amends certain provisions of Statement No. 67, *Financial Reporting for Pension Plans* and Statement No. 68 for pension plans and pensions that are within their respective scopes.

GASB Statement No. 76, *The Hierarchy of Generally Accepted Accounting Principles for State and Local Governments*, issued June 2015. The objective of this Statement is to identify—in the context of the current governmental financial reporting environment—the hierarchy of generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP). The “GAAP hierarchy” consists of the sources of accounting principles used to prepare financial statements of state and local governmental entities in conformity with GAAP and the framework for selecting those principles. This Statement reduces the GAAP hierarchy to two categories of authoritative GAAP and addresses the use of authoritative and non-authoritative literature in the event that the accounting treatment for a transaction or other event is not specified within a source of authoritative GAAP.

GASB Statement No. 79, *Certain External Investment Pools and Pool Participants*, issued December 2015. This Statement establishes criteria for an external investment pool to qualify for making the election to measure all of its investments at amortized cost for financial reporting purposes. This Standard also establishes additional note disclosure requirements for qualifying external investment pools that measure all of their investments at amortized cost for financial reporting purposes and for governments that participate in those pools.

As of June 30, 2016, GASB had issued several statements not yet required to be implemented by the District. The Statements which might impact the District are as follows:

GASB Statement No. 74, *Financial Reporting for Postemployment Benefit Plans Other Than Pension Plans*, issued June 2015, will be effective for the District beginning with its year ending June 30, 2017. This Statement replaces Statements No. 43, *Financial Reporting for Postemployment Benefit Plans Other Than Pension Plans*, as amended, and No. 57, *OPEB Measurements by Agent Employers and Agent Multiple-Employer Plans*. It also includes requirements for defined contribution OPEB plans that replace the requirements for those OPEB plans in Statement No. 25, *Financial Reporting for Defined Benefit Pension Plans and Note Disclosures for Defined Contribution Plans*, as amended, Statement 43, and Statement No. 50, *Pension Disclosures*.

GASB Statement No. 75, *Accounting and Financial Reporting for Postemployment Benefits Other Than Pensions*, issued June 2015, will be effective for the District beginning with its year ending June 30, 2018. This Statement replaces the requirements of Statements No. 45, *Accounting and Financial Reporting by Employers for Postemployment Benefits Other Than Pensions*, as amended, and No. 57, *OPEB Measurements by Agent Employers and Agent Multiple-Employer Plans, for OPEB*. Statement No. 74, *Financial Reporting for Postemployment Benefit Plans Other Than Pension Plans*, establishes new accounting and financial reporting requirements for OPEB plans. The scope of this Statement addresses accounting and financial reporting for OPEB that is provided to the employees of state and local governmental employers. This Statement establishes standards for recognizing and measuring liabilities, deferred outflows of resources, deferred inflows of resources, and expense/expenditures. For defined benefit OPEB, this Statement identifies the methods and assumptions that are required to be used to project benefit payments, discount projected benefit payments to their actuarial present value, and attribute that present value to periods of employee service. Note disclosure and required supplementary information requirements about defined benefit OPEB also are addressed.

GASB Statement No. 77, *Tax Abatement Disclosures*, issued August 2015, will be effective for the District beginning with its year ending June 30, 2017. This Statement is intended to provide additional information about tax abatements to the public to further the ability to assess how tax abatements affect the District’s financial position and results of operations, including the District’s ability to raise revenue sources in the futures. This Statement requires disclosure of tax abatement information about (1) a

reporting government's own tax abatement agreements and (2) those that are entered into by other governments that reduce the reporting government's tax revenues.

GASB Statement No. 78, *Pensions Provided Through Certain Multiple-Employer Defined Benefit Pension Plans*, issued December 2015, will be effective for the District beginning with its year ending June 30, 2017. The objective of this Statement is to address the scope and applicability of Statement No. 68, Accounting and Financial Reporting for Pensions to exclude pensions provided to employees of state or local governmental employers through a cost-sharing multiple-employer defined benefit pension plan that (1) is not a state or local governmental pension plan, (2) is used to provide defined benefit pensions to both employees of state and local governments and to employees who are not state or local governmental employees, and (3) has no predominate state or local government employer.

GASB Statement No. 80, *Blending Requirements for Certain Component Units – An Amendment of GASB Statement No. 14*, issued January 2016, will be effective for the District beginning with its year ending June 30, 2017. This Statement amends the blending requirements for the financial statement presentation of component units of state and local governments. The additional criterion requires blending of a component unit incorporated as a not-for-profit corporation in which the primary government is the sole corporate member.

GASB Statement No. 81, *Irrevocable Split-Interest Agreements*, issued March 2016, will be effective for the District beginning with its year ending June 30, 2018. The objective of this Statement is to improve accounting and financial reporting for irrevocable split-interest agreements by providing recognition and measurement guidance for situations in which a government is a beneficiary of the agreement.

GASB Statement No. 82, *Pension Issues – an amendment of GASB Statements No. 67, No. 68, and No. 73*, issued March 2016, will be effective for the District beginning with its year ending June 30, 2018. This Statement addresses issues regarding (1) the presentation of payroll-related measures in required supplementary information, (2) the selection of assumptions and the treatment of deviations from the guidance in an Actuarial Standard of Practice for financial reporting purposes, and (3) the classification of payments made by employers to satisfy employee (plan member) contribution requirements.

The District's management has not yet determined the effect these GASB Statements will have on the District's financial statements.
